Dear Supporters, Partners, & Friends,



This has been a hard year for reproductive healthcare, women's rights, and human rights as a whole. Severe federal funding cuts continue to devastate nonprofits like ours, and I fear these attacks on social services are far from over.

Still, I see hope. Every day, people are stepping up, speaking out and showing support for the mission we've carried for 56 years – providing high quality,

low-cost reproductive healthcare to anyone who needs it, regardless of their ability to pay. Our local foundation's support has remained generous, and we are grateful for their continued advocacy in our work. Individual supporters have been hearing the call and stepping up through gifts, both large and small. Every donation makes an impact.

We've expanded our staff to meet the growing number of patients and outreach in schools, colleges, partner agencies, and community events. Retired RN Judy Pulito joined us as a Health Educator/Outreach Coordinator; with her, Colleen, and Alexis, we have an excellent, experienced, and well-trained education team. On the clinical side, Nurse Practitioner Tammy Nemeth now covers Saturday clinics and fills in as needed. I am truly proud of our skilled, compassionate team of medical and administrative professionals who care deeply for every patient.

When it comes to funding, we are at a crossroads. For 55 years—since Title X began in 1970—we have provided reproductive healthcare services at little or no cost to anyone who walks through our doors. If the proposed Congressional budget—calling for the complete elimination of Title X—passes, we will lose half of our operating budget. Not only here, but across the country, people with little or no insurance and those living below the poverty line will lose these vital services. Birth control, cancer screenings, STI testing and treatment, and HIV testing and prevention will no longer be available on a sliding fee scale based on income. When the cost of healthcare becomes unaffordable, families suffer—and so do their communities.

Together, we have taken significant steps toward creating a more equitable and accessible clinic, but the work is far from over. We look forward to continuing our efforts and building upon this foundation with the ongoing support of our community.

Family Planning Services of Lorain County strengthens our community by providing accessible reproductive healthcare & education services.

MEETING PEOPLE WHERE THEY ARE

Partner with 48+ community agencies to deliver reproductive health education, testing & care in schools, shelters, recovery centers, correctional facilities & other community spaces.

HEALTH EDUCATION & EMPOWERMENT

Inclusive, age-appropriate reproductive health education for youth & adults — from workshops on consent, STIs, HIV, & birth control to pregnancy prevention — helping people make informed choices about health, relationships, & autonomy.

ON-SITE TESTING, COUNSELING & REFERRALS

Free STI & HIV testing where people live, learn & seek support — reducing stigma & transportation barriers. Linkage to birth control, PrEP & PEP, Pap tests (cervical cancer screening), breast & testicular screening & education, plus safer sex education & 1-on-1 risk reduction counseling.

New Initiatives Strengthening Community Health

HIV Prevention Grant

Cuyahoga County Board of Health - Began August 2024

- Countywide program supports free HIV testing, education, risk reduction counseling, & referrals for PrEP, PEP, & treatment
- Services provided in correctional facilities, shelters, harm reduction clinics, campuses, health fairs, medical facilities, & other community sites — bringing prevention directly to where people live, learn, & gather
- Condom Bowl Partnerships Partner sites across the county host bowls we supply with condoms, safer sex items, educational materials, & new patient cards — making prevention resources easy to access & stigma-free

Healthy Start Grant

Lorain County Public Health - Began January 2025

- Supports postpartum moms & their babies with safe sleep gear, baby supplies, & health referrals
- Connects moms to counseling, substance use support, & other essential services to promote health, safety, & well-being

Harm Reduction Vending Machine


Partnership with Lorain County Public Health – Launched May 2025

- Provides free NARCAN®, fentanyl test strips, safer sex kits, pregnancy tests, period products, first aid kits, & more — expanding access to lifesaving & preventive supplies

Total Revenue: \$897,517



A Note on Title X Funding

Grants made up 73% of our total revenue in 2024, totaling \$655,187. Of that, \$380,000 came from the Title X federal family planning program, which has been a cornerstone of our funding since 1970. This single grant alone accounts for 42% of our total annual revenue.

Title X is currently at risk of being reduced to zero, posing a serious threat to our ability to provide affordable, accessible reproductive health care. The potential loss of this funding would drastically impact the services we can offer and the number of patients we can reach.

We continue to pursue diverse funding sources, but the magnitude of this possible cut cannot be overstated.



Surgeon General Calls For

IMPROVING, RENOVATING, AND GROWING IN 1994

The House Appropriations Committee voted on July 20 to eliminate Title X funds, the nations ONLY program devoted exclusively to the delivery of family planning services. The Title X program allows clinics such as Family Planning Services to provide contraceptive education, and services in addition to a range of screening and treatment services including breast and cervical cancer, sexually transmitted infections, hypertension, and anemia

The Committee voted to shift Title X funds to state controlled block grants used for Maternal and Child Health Programs and Community Health Centers. The most devastating factor is that Committee members failed to specify that the additional dollars be used for family planning.

The elimination of the Title X Family Planning Program is likely to leave millions of women without an afforable source of primary reproductive health care service. Title X funds account for 40% of Family Planning Services' budget. There are over 4,000 women who depend on our services every year. The loss of Title X funding will not only deny many women access to family planning services, but will make it financially impossible for them to go elsewhere.

Statistics show that women in their 20's are the primary users of family planning. Teenagers however, stand to lose all access to confidential services. This comes at a time when the United




